

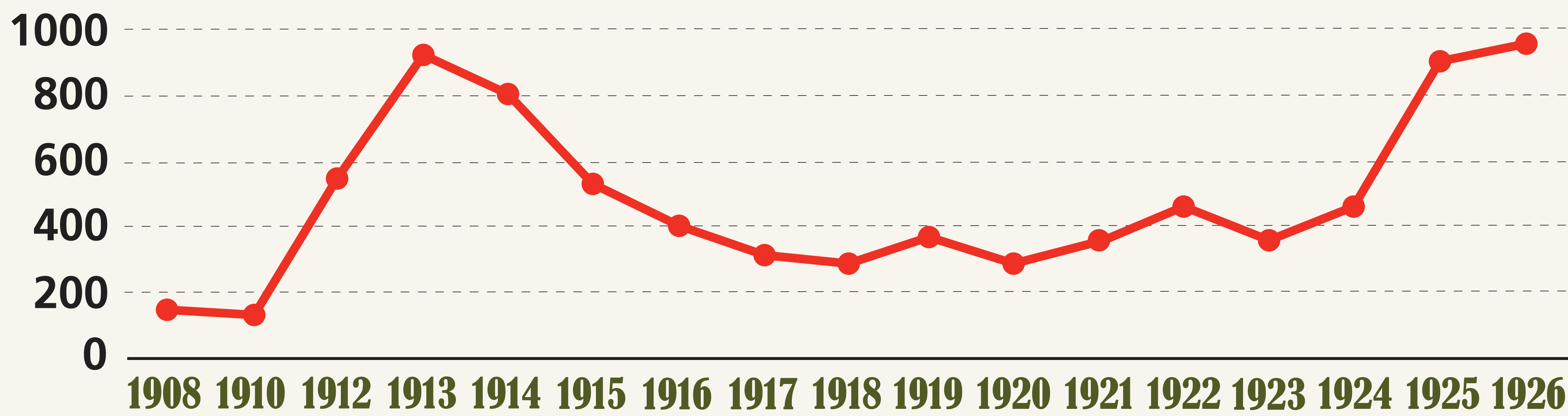
LORD'S DAY ACT

1907: The Lord's Day Act passes prohibiting work, entertainment and almost all commerce on Sundays.

“Breaches of the Lord's Day Act are largely confined to trade on Sundays by foreigners who take a chance when they can.”

JUVENILE DELINQUENTS

1874: Ontario passes the Industrial Schools Act. Industrial Schools were intended to “rescue” children found guilty of petty crimes and moral offences.

1908: The Juvenile Delinquents Act establishes a separate justice system for those aged 7 to 16 charged with violating a federal, provincial or municipal law. The act also included status offences like truancy, “sexual immorality,” and tobacco smoking that were not considered crimes if committed by adults.

OUTCOME OF 1,149 JUVENILE OFFENDERS FROM TORONTO SENTENCED IN 1926

- Committed to Mimico Industrial School
- Committed to St. John's Industrial School
- Fined
- Suspended Sentence
- Probation
- Discharged
